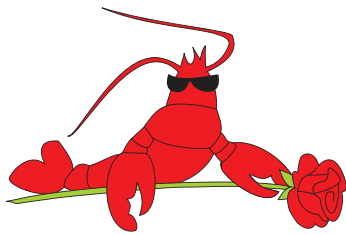

The District Director, Dave Long, called the meeting to order at 10:05 a.m. He stated that the By-Laws were sent out. He has appointed himself, Craig Dorschel, and two or three others to perform a By-Laws review.

Dave has requested that the minutes from the business meeting be sent to him within 30 days. He stated that a quorum is ten members of the Yankee District. He is still looking for a Deputy Director, which would be someone to fill in if the Director cannot be here. Dave spoke about ARS rotating awards. The Yankee District will have the Portland Trophy in 2020. The Ruth Tiedman Trophy for arrangements was won by Patsy Cunningham in 2018, and the Rosedale Bowl was won by Zack Lau also in 2018.

A judging school is planned for September 6 and 7 2019 at the Chatham Community Center. It will be a full school with lectures and test.

SECRETARY (Audrey Osborn) — A motion was made by Andy Venable and seconded by Jacqui Nye to accept the minutes from the September 9, 2018 business meeting held in Barnstable, Massachusetts.

TREASURER — Dave Ciak resigned as Treasurer. He has been replaced by Paul Raymond. This was voted on by the Executive Committee. Craig Dorschel made a motion to affirm. It was unanimously passed for Paul Raymond to be the new Yankee District Treasurer.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

TREASURER REPORT — There was just a summary in the computer by Ciak, with a discrepancy of \$151 in our favor. The beginning balance from January 1, 2018 was \$8,602.98 with income of \$14,451.60. Expenses

were \$3,361.63. New England Rose Society hadn't been paid. End of 2018 \$11,089.97 total. Should have been \$11,240.97 leaving the Yankee District at the end with \$9,716.89. Dave asked to hold off on the budget until after this meeting. Going forward he will do for three years. New England was happy with the check amount they received. He commended New England for their good convention. A motion was made by Audrey Osborn and seconded by Craig Dorschel to accept the Treasurer Report.

NEWSLETTER — Andy Venable stated: "I am extremely proud of the three newsletters that we have in the district. As Patsy stated last night, we also have a lot of excellent writers as well, with the many ARS AOM awards received as well with all three newsletters having authors honored.

"The only society in the District without a newsletter is the newly formed Cape Cod Rose Society. I do know that plans are in the works to resurrect the *Rose Beacon*, and I wish them well with getting their newsletter back in circulation. As always, I thank everyone for all that they contribute to these newsletters. Every newsletter that is published is a group project."

Andy has a ten year run with the newsletter. He is in year six, and will be looking for help. Pam is not going to take it over. Andy stated he is not doing it more than ten years.

PRIZES & AWARDS (Oz Osborn) — The Mike Lowe Trophy was not issued in 2017. In 2016 and 2018, it was awarded to Patsy Cunningham. In 2019, it will be

awarded at the New England Rose Show.

Patsy Cunningham won the Ruth Tiedman Arrangement Trophy. Zack Lau won the Rosedale Bowl. These are both National Awards. Oz will ship the trophies forward. Craig Dorschel will check with Carol Spiers as to where they will be sent.

The Yankee District Silver Medal was awarded to Dave Candler for the year 2019. The Outstanding Consulting Rosarian Award was awarded to Becky Martorelli, and the Outstanding Judge Award was awarded to Craig Dorschel.

The Ralph Moore Trophy for seven miniature roses was won by Dave Candler.

The Horace J. McFarland Trophy for five hybrid tea exhibition roses was awarded for the third year in a row to Jon Heino.

There are three new Master Rosarians: Cindy Ehrenreich, Becky Martorelli, and Teresa Mosher.

HORTICULTURE JUDGING (Ed Cunningham) There will be a Horticulture Judging School held in conjunction with Lobsterfest weekend. There will be a class during the day, and we need to be out in time for the boat ride by 5:00 p.m. The test will be held during the rose show.

ARRANGEMENT JUDGING (Craig Dorschel) — Friday, the 29th of May, 2019 there will be an Ikebana potluck with the Boston International Ikebana Association at the Elm Bank Wellsley Carriage House. Both Western and Asian food will be served. The website is Ikebana International Boston.

The *ARS Guidelines for Arrangement Judging* has not been updated since 2006. This is a big project that Nancy Redington was going to do, but she has had many life changes and never was able to work on this.

To be an ARS judge one must be an ARS member for a

total of 24 months, and twelve months before being a judge. There can be a gap in between.

There will be an ARS Arrangement Judge School on July 27 and 28 in Fraser, Pennsylvania at the Hampton Inn Great Valley – Route 30 and 202. (This is near Valley Forge and Longwood Gardens.)

ARS website guidelines — Chapter 19 will be changed based on current guidelines — up on message — Pat Bilson (PatBilson@yahoo.com). There will be an ARS National Convention, October 4-7, in Franklin, Tennessee as part of mini show program.

Dave Long asked the committee chairs to send their messages/notes ahead of time for future business meetings.

CONSULTING ROSARIANS (Andy Venable) — “Currently we have 35 CRs in the District. While we may have lost one CR to retirement we still retain an excellent core group that is always helpful and generously give of their knowledge and experience.

“The CR Report reporting time has passed, and participation is about 50%. This is a little lower than I'd like to see, and I'm looking for suggestions on how to improve the reporting procedure and hopefully increase participation in the process.

“Plans are well underway for a CR School in 2021. Becky Martorelli is coordinating the School. We are looking for a “head count” as to the number of people who plan on attending. This will help us to get a large enough room but not to incur additional cost for reserving more than we need. The idea of charging a nominal fee (\$10 - \$20) has been floated, and we would like input on this as well. We also need to continue to replenish the CR pool, and if anyone is interested in becoming a CR please do not be shy, and feel free to contact me.”

The CR School will be open to everyone. One does not have to be an ARS member to attend. Currently, one has to be an ARS member for three years to become a CR. It has been proposed to changing it to two years.

Each society should find out how many members would be interested in attending a School in 2021 at the April 9-11 Yankee District Convention held in Connecticut.

WEBSITE (Patsy Cunningham) — Patsy plans on redoing the website in the spring, when she cuts back in her current work job. She will have a new menu, and a CR and Judge page. Please send pictures to Patsy. Patsy has purchased a new website program.

ROSES IN REVIEW (Paul Raymond) — There is a new website, but Paul hasn't seen it yet. It should be easier to fill out and tabulate. It is imperative that members review their roses, because we are in the north, and we need to be represented. Membership responding from the District is down.

MEMBERSHIP/OGR (Mirjana Toyn) — Not getting reports from ARS. Got up to date information — currently there are 287 Yankee District members. A few memberships expire today, some have expired the end of February.

A database for OGRs grown, and roses members are willing to share. Patsy will work to make a database for old roses. Patsy — presentation — just in District, as a test run, roses others are willing to share.

PHOTOGRAPHY (Jacqui Nye) — It was a nice photography show. This is year four. Bill Kozemchak was a guest judge. Questions were raised about sharing photos, and then these same photos show up

all over the web. Maybe there should not be a share button? Patsy mentioned a watermark could be used.

OLD BUSINESS

Purchase of public audio/video equipment. We need a projector, we pray that the one we are using the bulb doesn't die. Irwin Ehrenreich made a motion for the purchase of the equipment, it was seconded by Craig Dorschel. Sandy Long suggested an amendment to the motion. Yankee District should purchase a good quality piece of equipment. It is now in the hands of the District Director/Executive Committee.

Sandy Long: Move for a motion that the Yankee District purchase a good projector system, an amount of money the Executive Committee authorizes to purchase. In hands of the District Director in addition to audio system (\$250.00) Dave Candler seconded the motion.

NEW BUSINESS

Fall Convention: Participants must pay "up front" — reservations with no refund.

2019 Lobsterfest/Fall Convention — Dave Long proposed that we have a reservation deadline, if someone doesn't show, they won't be eligible for a refund. Cindy Ehrenreich seconded the motion. Chatham is the location for the School/rose show.

2020 — Rhode Island is hosting the Yankee District Spring Convention. Paul Raymond helped find the hotel. The owner and the owner's son will be good to the RIRS. (There will be no stairs to climb!) There will be a shuttle bus, a sample menu was presented. (It sounds good.)

2021 Spring Convention — CR School — Connecticut Rose Society

used for the ARS donation of \$600.00 last year, and \$600.00 the year before that.

If one approves the budget, one approves this donation as well. This motion was seconded by David Cannistraro.

OTHER NEW BUSINESS

District Director, Dave Long, presented a "proposed" resolution to Yankee District members. He stated that he was proposing to host an American Rose Society National Convention. He said he has been on the Board for six years, and the last time a national convention was held in New England was 1992 (twenty six years ago), and a mini convention was held in 2001. He was on a bus ride outside San Diego sitting with the Gibsons and Craig Dorschel. Dave brought up a national convention, and people said, "Why don't you do it."

Dave visited the Crown Plaza in Warwick, Rhode Island, exit 12 on Route 95, twenty minutes from Providence. There is no parking fee, and it is close to

T.F. Green Airport. The Providence Convention Bureau (funded by Rhode Island — no cost to the hotel) has been helpful in making arrangements. A few other venues were investigated. Negotiations for a contract have been started, contingent on approval from the ARS Yankee members.

Benefits of this location: Newport bus ride, bus to Cape Cod, train to Boston, WaterFire, and great restaurants. Louis Horne mentioned there is a great hospitality room there. Chuck Brailsford mentioned a 125th celebration that was held at the Crown Plaza, and it was perfect. Chuck's group had planned 1-1/2 to 2 years to do this.

Penn/Jersey voted they would help out with the Convention. We would need to provide a meeting room (like we had in Gettysburg and Syracuse) at the convention. Don't count on the Gibsons for help, the New York State Fair is the last week in August, and they are very active with that venue.

Dave C: We would have roses in June. Contact the hotel for room rates for June.

Question of Rocky Mountain hosting a National Convention in June of 2020?

Cindy Ehrenreich suggested June of 2021 with no locally hosted convention that year.

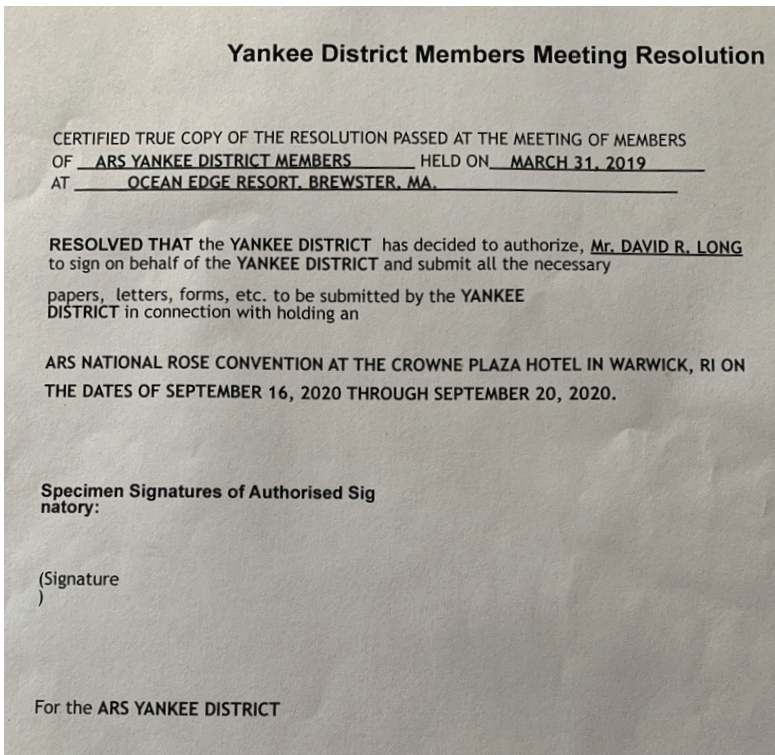
Dave Long stated that Audrey Osborn motioned for a paper ballot and this motion was seconded by Cindy Ehrenreich.

Judging School

Friday - Saturday, Sept. 6th & 7th, 2019

Yankee District Chair of Horticulture Judges

The ARS/Yankee District will be hosting a Horticultural Judging School at the Chatham Community Center, 702 Main Street, Chatham, Massachusetts 02633 on Friday, September 6, 2019 and Saturday, September 7, 2019.

Although this School is being held in conjunction with the ARS Yankee District's annual "Lobsterfest" Convention, arrangements will have to be made separately for the Lobsterfest and to attend any of the Lobsterfest's other activities/functions.

The purposes of this school are:

1. to present the fundamental concepts & guidelines utilized in judging a rose show,
And, if the student wishes, and is qualified,
2. to administer a "WRITTEN TEST" to candidates for Apprentice Judge, and
3. additionally, to have the candidates for Apprentice Judge demonstrate their proficiency in the actual "hands-on," "PRACTICAL TEST" of judging a small rose show, which will be set up immediately after the District show.

Everyone is welcome to register for the first day's (informational) session (on Friday). Only students whose prior experience and achievements qualify them to be eligible to apply to become Apprentice

Judges will be allowed to participate in Saturday's (testing) sessions.

NOTE: For ACCREDITED JUDGES teaching at, assisting at, or attending, this school, will be accepted as meeting your four-year recertification requirement, and will push your need for another Judgeship recertification forward to 2024.

"Accredited judges are encouraged to attend. Accredited judges will receive an audit credit for attending and/or teaching at the school. It is necessary to have a number of accredited judges present to set up and score the practical exam."

As noted on the Registration Form (see page 15), that there will be a \$10.00 School registration fee.

There is also general information on the site for students, who are deciding whether to register as candidates to become Apprentice Judges.

NOTE: For CANDIDATES to become an APPRENTICE JUDGES: The qualifications required before you can file an application with ARS to become an Apprentice Judge are listed on the Announcement/Registration Form (see page 15).

If seeking to become a Horticultural Judge, **CHECK THE “JUDGE CANDIDATE” BOX** when you fill out this form. **ALSO, BE AWARE OF THE 12 “CRITERIA”** ON PAGE 15.

Then, we will send you the ARS **“Application for Apprentice Rose Judge Certification.”** You will need to complete that ARS application, and, along with its fee, return it to the same above addressee, prior to the school.

IF NOT SEEKING TO BECOME A JUDGE, but only interested in attending & learning, you can still register to audit the first day ONLY (the classroom portion). Fee is still \$10.00.

Classroom work will be held on Friday, Sept. 6th.
The ARS “Judging Exam” is on Saturday, Sept. 7th - for Judge Candidates ONLY
Both days work must be attended, and completed successfully, in order to be declared an “Apprentice” (probationary) judge.

NOTE: This school is being held simultaneously with the Yankee District Lobsterfest.

HOWEVER, you must REGISTER SEPERATELY for the Y.D. Lobsterfest.

If anyone wishes to attend this school without attending the Lobsterfest, they may do so.

CRITERIA TO APPLY TO BE AN APPRENTICE JUDGE

Qualifications To be certified as an Apprentice Rose Judge, the applicant must:

1. Have completed an accredited judging school and passed both the written and practical exams.
2. Have personally grown garden roses or been involved in their culture for five years.
3. Have been a member of the American Rose Society for at least twenty-four months, including the twelve months immediately preceding becoming an Apprentice Rose Judge.
4. Have exhibited in the horticulture section of at least a total of five ARS accredited rose shows over a period of at least three years. The applicant should have won at least five horticulture blue ribbons and at least two ARS horticulture certificates or equivalent awards.
5. Have worked in at least three rose shows, either as a clerk or in some other capacity, such as show chairman or clerks' chairman that would familiarize the applicant with proper show procedures.
6. Pay the application fee set by the American Rose Society.

In addition, an applicant is expected to:

1. Be a person of high integrity who is able to subjugate all personal likes, dislikes and biases.
2. Be diplomatic, constructive, and definite in adhering to rules and passing judgment.
3. Be observant and careful in all details.
4. Be able to substantiate decisions with concrete and specific reasons.
5. Know the characteristics and range of variability of the varieties of roses commonly exhibited in his or her area.
6. Know and follow ARS show rules, ARS standards of judging, and local show rules, unless the local show rules are in conflict with the ARS rules and standards.

(these last 6 criteria will be scrutinized if you become an Apprentice Judge).

Important Notice to Horticulture Judges

The Yankee District is hosting a Horticultural Judging School in Chatham, Massachusetts, on Friday, September 6, (the day before the Yankee District Rose Show). We recently received word from Bruce Monroe that your attendance/assistance at the Judging School being held in conjunction with the Lobsterfest will earn you recertification credit. That will push your Seminar requirement back to 2024.

Consequently, the Yankee District will **not** be holding a Judges' Seminar next year (in 2020). Therefore, this will be your **only local** (in the Yankee District) opportunity to fulfill your requirement to attend a Judging Seminar by 2020.

If you are not able, or do not wish to attend this Judge School/Seminar, you are advised to check the ARS magazine, and the ARS website, for notices from

other Districts that might be planning to hold a Judge School/Seminar sometime by 2020.

ADDITIONALLY: Judges attending this Judge School/Seminar at the 2019 Lobsterfest & District Convention are requested to bring more roses than you intend to exhibit, so they may be utilized in the Judge School Practical Test which will follow immediately after judging of the District Rose Show.

100 roses are considered necessary for a "Practical Test." Some roses will be requisitioned from the show immediately upon completion of the judging of the District Show, but it is expected that additional roses will be needed. Your help in this matter will be greatly appreciated.

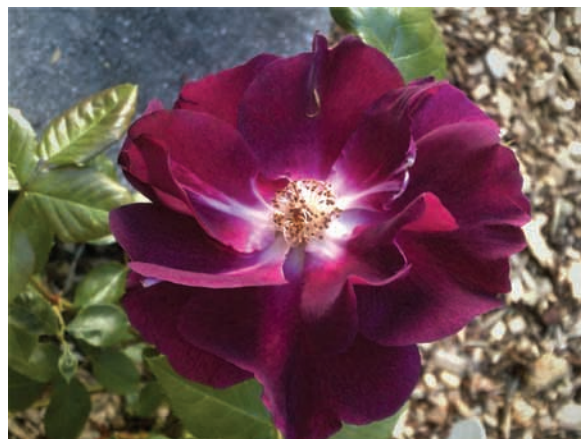

A Little Bitty about Gil & Diane

The Rhode Island Rose Society (like many societies) gets new members all of the time. I try to be a good Consulting Rosarian and introduce myself to these new members when I see them. And, I try to find out where these new members are in their quest for the perfect rose garden. A few years ago, one married couple (Gil and Diane) and I, struck up a few conversations about rose culture and historic roses.

During our discussions, I found out that Gil is the rose aficionado, and Diane enjoys many other different types of plants and flowers. Along the way, they asked me to come by their garden and let them know my thoughts on how it could be improved. When I went to their garden, I noticed big trees with thousands of tangled roots that were invading the roses. These same trees were shading the roses more than they should, and the roses were suffering. I gave them my observations, and didn't get a good feeling that my suggestions would be



followed. There were definite logistical problems that made it impossible to remove the trees, and the roses would have to do the best that they could with the sunlight that was available and the invading roots that were there.

By this time, it was clear that Gil was the rosarian in the family, and Diane was doing the best that she could to help, but deferred to Gil for any final decisions regarding the roses. I did my best to instill in Diane that the principles that she was using with the perennials and other plants, could easily be transferred to the roses, and the garden would be much improved. For the next couple of years, I would stop by periodically to see how they were doing with their garden. I could slowly see improvement in the roses. I could also see where Diane was starting to take more of a role in taking care of the roses, and the roses were responding. I told both Gil and Diane that if they worked together, they would learn from each other. And they did

start to work together more, and the roses were much improved. They were both extremely happy to show me the fruits of their labors, and the new beds, and the new areas in the garden that they created, and the new roses the planted there.

In addition to being a rosarian, Gil is an amateur historian of sorts. He loves the history of his town (Plainville), his 19th century home, and the antique roses that he has added to his gardens to complement his house. One of his most precious roses he grows is 'Nastarana,' a Noisette discovered in 1879 by Ernest François Pissard. Coincidentally, 1879 is the same year that his house was built. O.k., now you've got my attention — a Noisette that is hardy here in New England. How rare is that? Other roses that Gil grows for their historic value include many from one of my most respected hybridizing families, the

Brownell family right here in Rhode Island. Beauties from a bygone era, so important to the development of the rose — 'Lafter,' 'Golden Arctic,' 'Rhode Island Red,' 'Senior Prom,' 'Maria Stern,' 'Lily Pons,' and the list goes on and on from there. The list of old roses doesn't end there. More old roses and old garden roses are tucked away here and there. Beauties such as 'Albertine,' 'Charles de Mills,' 'Common Moss,' 'Tuscany,' 'Mme. Plantier,' 'Lowe's Eglantine,' 'Old Blush,' and even 'The Green Rose.' Gil also has expanded his collection to many of the "old favorites" and "old faithfuls" from the 20th Century. In addition to the Brownell roses, Gil has planted 'Chrysler Imperial,' 'Peace,' 'Dortmund,'

'New Dawn,' and a dozen or more other roses from that bygone era. In some areas of the garden, if you didn't know any better, you might think that you were back in the '60's tending to the roses *before* watching Apollo 11 touch down on the moon — LIVE.

Contrasting Gil's selection of older and antique roses, Diane takes a different approach to what she likes to grow. She often refers to herself as the "Purple Rose Lady." She has many mauve and dark modern roses that were introduced recently. Such beauties as 'Twilight Zone,' 'Falstaff,' 'Royal Amethyst,' 'Intrigue,' etc. are scattered throughout the garden. She touts some of the parentages of her roses, and is proud of what she is able to show me. She doesn't limit herself to just purple. David Austin is the name, and David Austin roses she must grow. Her Austin roses are enjoyed for their fragrance *and* their beauty. 'Lady of Shallot,' 'The Mayflower,' 'Graham Thomas,' 'Alnwick Castle,' etc. are scattered everywhere. They blend in well with the older roses, and Diane just can't help but take pictures of her roses. She does not limit herself to just the mauve and Austin roses. She enjoys modern favorites such as 'Jump for Joy,' 'Correta Scott King,' 'Dick Clark,' and even my own, 'Hera's Song.'

Growing Roses From Cuttings Revisited

With the September Yankee District weekend on the Cape just around the corner, I thought that I would update the way we are growing our cuttings.

My previous article in last year's August newsletter discussed placing multiple cuttings in a gallon size zipper bag with a mixture of moist potting soil and perlite at the bottom. This still is a good method used successfully by many rosarians, but we have found that using a small pot for each cutting with a sandwich bag over the pot and secured with a rubber band, is better for us. We can monitor each cutting better and label each bag with the name of the cutting. It's also easier to discard any cuttings that don't survive without disturbing the others.

We're looking forward to a repeat of last year's cutting workshop at our home. Many people who attended and took cuttings have shown me photos



of their cuttings that have grown over the year. Dave Cannistraro brought some "Scarlet Bonica" (aka 'Canyon Road') and 'Jeanne LaJoie,' grown from cuttings at last year's workshop, to the RIRS meeting for a fundraiser.

This is an easy way to share roses, especially hard to find or out of commerce roses between rose society members. We hope that all of you will attend the Yankee District weekend, and stay for Sunday's Cutting Workshop. I will be sending out an email to the Yankee District members with a current list of all our roses that will be available for taking cuttings. My

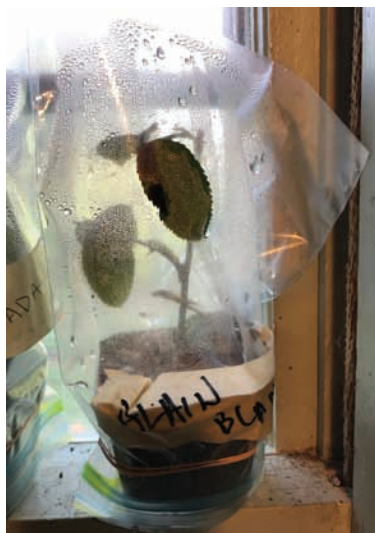

It is time to start the annual review of your roses for the American Rose Society. The electronic format is easier than ever this year. Go to the web page of the ARS (rose.org), and watch and listen to the tutorial. In case you missed the missive from the ARS, the address is <https://www.rose.org/roses-inreview-2019>.

A couple of suggestions. First print out the cultivars that they are asking for. Go through the list and identify the targeted roses that you are growing. Make a list. Next print the mail in form. Fill it out manually for all of your roses. Go back to the website, and, at your leisure, fill out the electronic version. This way, it will be complete, and you will have a written copy.

It used to be mandatory that Consulting Rosarians fill out their reviews. Now, it is only highly recommended. I think everyone who loves and grows roses (like we do), should really want to get their evaluations in for the District. The District depends on these evaluations to give their recommendations. Our area has quite unique climate features, and the roses should be tested against them, so that we will know what grows in our area, and not only what grows well in California, or Oregon. So, please help yourself start the process. Today, identify the roses that are being evaluated that you are growing.

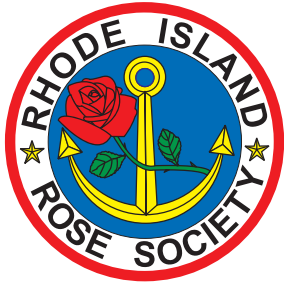

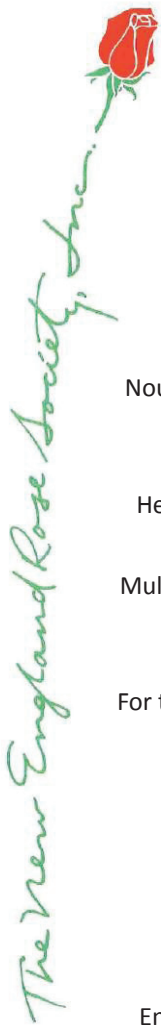

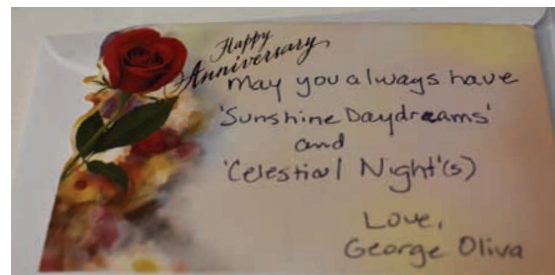

Rules for Rose Specimen Entries

1. Except as noted in the schedule, competition is open to all rose growers regardless of residence. All entries must have been grown by the exhibitor in his or her own private outdoor garden. Only one person or team from any one garden may enter a Class.
2. Entries will be received from 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m., Saturday, September 7, 2019. Judging will begin at 10:15 a.m. The show will open to the public at 1:00 p.m. or when judging is complete.
3. The show committee will furnish all containers, including those specified for challenge classes. All entries must be accompanied by a securely folded ARS entry tag showing: section, class, variety name, and the exhibitor's name and address. Both portions of the entry tag must be completed.
4. Wedges and supports are permitted. An entry may be penalized if wedging material extends above the top of the vase according to its degree of distraction.
5. Rose varieties exhibited must be entered under the approved exhibition name of the American Rose Society as listed in any one of the following official ARS publications: *Modern Roses Database*, *the Official List of Approved Exhibition Names for Judges & Exhibitors*, *the Handbook for Selecting Roses*, the Rose Registrations column of the *American Rose* magazine or Recent Registrations on the ARS website. In cases where a variety is not listed in any of the above ARS publications, a listing in *The Combined Rose List* is acceptable. Classification of all roses shall be in accordance with ARS publications to the date of the show. In the event of a conflict, the most recent ARS publication will prevail.
6. This is an alphabetical show. With the exception of challenge classes and classes specifying multiple varieties, all roses in each class will be placed alphabetically and each variety in each class shall constitute a separate class to be judged separately.
7. ARS Gold, Silver and Bronze Certificates will be awarded to Queen, King, and Princess of Show. ARS Miniature Gold, Silver, and Bronze Certificates will be awarded to Miniature Queen, King, and Princess of Show. ARS Miniflora Gold, Silver, and Bronze Certificates will be awarded to Miniflora Queen, King, and Princess of Show. ARS Certificates will be awarded in all other classes for which available.
8. During placement, only the Show Committee will be permitted in the show area. However, exhibitors shall be allowed to place their entries in all classes without restriction. During the judging, only Judges, Clerks, and members of the Show Committee shall be permitted in the show area.

9. A challenge class exhibit may not be touched, moved, or adjusted by any person other than the exhibitor prior to the judging of the class. Exhibits should be placed so that they do not interfere with those of any other exhibitor.
10. Judging shall be in accordance with rules and regulations of the American Rose Society, and all decisions of the judges are final. Blue ribbon winners only will be eligible for trophy awards.
11. Horticulture Division entries in violation of ARS or Show Rules shall be disqualified. Entries shall also be disqualified for the following reasons:
 - a. Misnamed, misclassified, misplaced, unlabeled, or mislabeled roses.
 - b. Stem-on-stem (except for OGRs and Shrubs).
 - c. Presence of foreign substance applied to the foliage, stem, or bloom.
12. Specimens will be judged on a 100 point scale as follows:

Form	25 Points
Color	20 Points
Substance	15 Points
Stem and Foliage	20 Points
Balance and Proportion	10 Points
Size	10 Points
13. Trophies will be awarded on Saturday, September 7, at the Lobsterfest on Grey's Beach.
14. Neither the Yankee District or the Cape Cod Rose Society, shall be liable for loss or damage to entries, containers, or property, or for injury to persons attending the rose show. Liability of all nature is disclaimed.
15. Exhibitors should be aware that after judging, some horticultural entries may be removed temporarily to a separate room for the purpose of providing specimens for the Horticultural Judging School practicum.

- Section A -

Yankee District Challenge Classes

Classes 1-4 are open only to ARS Members residing in the Yankee District. Each container must have its own entry tag. Limit one entry per exhibitor. Please note that the AARS Yankee District Trophy has been discontinued.

— Class 1 —

J. Horace McFarland Memorial Trophy

Five (5) hybrid tea blooms, each a different variety, displayed in separate containers. All roses must be at exhibition stage.

— Class 2 —

Ralph S. Moore District Award

Seven (7) miniature roses, each a different variety, exhibited in separate containers. All roses must be at exhibition stage.

— Class 3 —

Yankee Rosarian Trophy

Three (3) different shrub varieties (classic or modern), one bloom or spray (two or more blooms), exhibited in separate containers.

— Class 4 —

Yankee District Ben Williams Miniflora Trophy

Five (5) miniflora blooms, each a different variety, displayed in separate containers. All roses must be at exhibition stage.

— Class 12 —

One Modern Shrub Bloom or Spray

Varieties classified as Shrub (S)

— Class 13 —

David Austin Rose

One bloom or spray of any rose introduced by David Austin Roses.

— Class 14 —

Dowager Queen

One bloom or spray of any old garden rose introduced prior to 1867 (including roses of unknown dates known to have been in existence prior to 1867); All Species (Sp) roses to be shown in this class regardless of date of introduction.

— Class 15 —

Victorian Award

Old garden roses introduced in 1867 or later, or with unknown dates of origin of 1867 or later.

— Class 16 —

One Miniature bloom without sidebuds
Queen, King, and Princess of Show

— Class 17 —

One Miniature Spray (two or more blooms)

— Class 18 —

One Miniflora bloom without sidebuds
Queen, King, and Princess of Show

— Class 19 —

One Miniflora Spray (two or more blooms)

— Class 20 —

One Open Miniature or Miniflora Bloom without sidebuds – stamens prominently showing

- Section C -

Challenge Classes

Classes 21-31 are open to all exhibitors. Each container must have its own entry tag. Limit one entry per exhibitor.

— Class 21 —

Rose Bowl, Large Roses

One bloom of a rose with any classification *other* than miniature or miniflora, fully open with stamens prominently showing, floating in a bowl of clear water – no stem or foliage. Roses classified as single (4-8 petals) must be shown in Class 24.

— Class 22 —

Rose Bowl, Miniature Roses

One miniature rose bloom, fully open with stamens prominently showing, floating in a bowl of clear water – no stem or foliage. Roses classified as single (4-8 petals) must be shown in Class 25.

— Class 23 —

Rose Bowl, Miniflora Roses

One miniflora rose bloom, fully open with stamens prominently showing, floating in a bowl of clear water – no stem or foliage. Roses classified as single (4-8 petals) must be shown in Class 25.

— Class 24 —

Single Petal Rose Bowl, Large Roses

One bloom of a rose with any classification *other* than miniature or miniflora, and classified as a single (4-8 petals), floating in a bowl of clear water – no stem or foliage.

— Class 25 —

Single Petal Rose Bowl, Miniature/Miniflora Roses

One miniature or miniflora rose, classified as a single (4-8 petals), floating in a bowl of clear water – no stem or foliage.

— Class 26 —

Trailing Rose

One stem of any type rose that blooms along a cane on short laterals, e.g., ground cover roses, climbing miniatures, polyanthas. Displayed in water tube with 18" square black drape. Roses should not extend beyond cloth square on allotted table space. Tube and drape provided by show committee.

— Class 27 —

Cycle of Bloom

Three Hybrid Teas, Grandifloras, Floribundas, Miniatures, or Minifloras of the same variety in separate vases; one at the bud stage (approximately one-quarter open), one at the exhibition stage (two-thirds to three-quarters open) and one at open bloom stage (stamens must be showing).

— Class 28 —

Big/Little

Two blooms or two sprays of two different varieties. One exhibited in a large container (9" high) and one in a small container (4" high). Roses of any class can be used with either the large or the small containers.

— Class 29 —

Matched Pair

Two blooms or sprays of the same variety exhibited in two separate containers.

— Class 30 —

English Box, Large Roses

Six blooms of any roses with classifications *other* than miniature or miniflora without foliage, one, two, or three varieties in a box provided by the Show Committee.

— Class 31 —

English Box, Miniature/Miniflora Roses

Six miniature or miniflora roses, one, two, or three varieties, exhibited without foliage in a box provided by the Show Committee.

— Class 32 —

Judges of the Show

Judges of the show and immediate family may enter up to three specimens corresponding to Classes 5-20. Please note the corresponding class on the entry tag.

Yankee District Convention Fall 2019 Rose Show in Photographs

September 7, 2019

General Rules

1. Exhibitors can be a member of any rose society or the American Rose Society.
2. Entries will be accepted up to 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, September 7th.
3. Entries will be placed by the committee.
4. Judging will start at 10:15 a.m. (the same time as Horticulture judging). The decision of the judges is final.
5. Entries can be removed by the exhibitor at the end of the show during breakdown.
6. Due to the size of the show and the high interest in photography we will limit the amount of entries to no more than ten. Exhibitors can enter up to three entries in each class but can enter as many classes as desired. A photograph may not be entered in more than one class.
7. All photographs must be the work of the photographer, and must be the work of a single photographer.
8. Previous winning entries (1st, 2nd or 3rd) in any ARS Photography Local, or District Photography competition are prohibited.
9. Photographs may be digital or film; digital or darkroom enhancements are allowed.
10. Photographs must be in color except for the Macro Photography Class (Class 7) where color, black and white, sepia, or combinations are allowed.
11. Photographs must be 8"x10". This size is considered better for viewing.
12. Each entry must have a properly completed entry tag (same as a rose show).
13. The entry tag is to be folded and paper clipped to the top left front corner of the photo.
14. ARS exhibition names are to be used.
15. Entry tags and report covers will be available at the show.
16. First, Second and Third place or no award may be awarded.
17. Best of each class will be chosen from the first place awards. Each Best in Class is eligible for Queen, King, or Princess.
18. There will be no ribbons awarded for this small informal show.

Fall Rose Show in Photographs cont.

Criteria for Judging

Conformance – 10 points, Adhering to the requirements of the class descriptions.

Specific Section – 40 points, Entry is correct for the class in the schedule.

Composition – 15 points, Includes point of interest, balance, contrast, and viewpoint.

Technique – 15 points, Correct exposure, sharp focus of the main subject, and other technical issues.

Distinction – 20 points, What makes the photograph unique and over others in its class.

Schedule

– ONE BLOOM –

Class 1 – One bloom, no side buds, of a Hybrid Tea, Grandiflora, Miniature, Miniflora, or Floribunda at exhibition stage. Roses that have stamens showing, and/or roses classified as single (4-8 petals) must be entered in the Fully Open Bloom Class (Class 3).

– ONE SPRAY –

Class 2 – One spray of two or more blooms of any class of rose (*does not* include collections).

– FULLY OPEN BLOOM –

Class 3 – One bloom, fully open, no side buds, of a Hybrid Tea, Grandiflora, Miniature, Miniflora, or Floribunda, stamens must show. Roses classified as singles (4-8 petals) must be shown in this class.

– OLD GARDEN ROSE, SHRUB, SPECIES, POLYANTHA or LARGE FLOWERED CLIMBER –

Class 4 – One bloom (with or without side buds) or spray of two or more blooms of an OGR, Species, Shrub, Polyantha or Large Flowered Climber (*does not* include collections).

– ARRANGEMENTS –

Class 5 – A photo of an arrangement following the *ARS Guidelines for Judging Rose Arrangements* – Traditional, Modern, or in the Oriental Manner. Arranger's name *must* be indicated on the entry tag.

Fall Rose Show in Photographs cont.

– NOVICE –

Class 6 – This class is open to an exhibitor who has never won a blue ribbon in the photography section of an ARS District, National, or local society photo show, or the ARS Digital Photography Show.

– MACRO PHOTOGRAPHY –

Class 7 – Photograph of an extreme close up of any part of a rose. This would include (but not limited to) prickles, leaves, canes, etc. — color/black & white/sepia and/or any combination of these are permitted in this class. Roses must be identified.

– PUBLIC OR PRIVATE ROSE GARDEN –

Class 8 – Photographs should show the use of roses within the structure of a garden which can be widely variable. Roses must dominate the photograph and some layout of the garden should be visible. The name of the garden *must* be listed on the entry tag. If garden where photograph was taken is unknown, state “Unknown Garden” on entry tag.

– ROSES THAT ATTRACT CRITTERS –

Class 9 – Any photograph of a rose with beneficials or pests.

– ROSE POTPOURRI –

Class 10 – A horticulture specimen that does not fit the criterion for Classes 1-9. For example, rose hips, foliage, roses with side buds, multiple sprays, seedlings, portion of a rose bush with companion plants, rose garden bouquets.

– JUDGE’S CLASS –

Class 11 – Anything goes.
